## 8 Mins action group plans village protest march

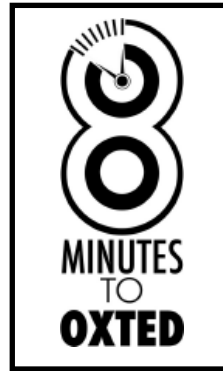
At eight minutes past two on Saturday afternoon parents and pupils attending Lingfield and Dormansland Primary Schools, resplendent in orange T-shirts, will march through Lingfield.

The march will leave the car park of Lingfield Primary School - after eight minutes of church bells ringing and the release of eight orange balloons - and will be headed up by East Surrey MP Peter Ainsworth, school governors and local councillors and will make its way, via the High Street, to the local Parish Church where Mr Ainsworth will address the gathering.

Teachers at the schools will act as marshals for the walk.

Saturday's rally has been organised by the 8 Minutes To Oxted action group which has been mounting a high profile campaign against Surrey County Council's Admission Policy Review which effectively axes - as from 2009 - Lingfield and Dormansland primary pupils from the Oxted School catchment area.

Parents have until January 31 to protest at the recommendations of the Review and a petition



has been running in Lingfield and Dormansland before Christmas.

The 8 Minutes To

Oxted action group is so-called because that is the average time it takes pupils from Lingfield and Dormansland to travel by train from Lingfield to Oxted.

Under the Policy Review recommendations Lingfield and Dormansland youngsters would have to travel to Oakwood School at Horley, a train journey of around 75 minutes.

### Dumped waste came from Streatham care home

Crownwise Ltd, of Streatham Common South, Streatham was found guilty at Redhill Magistrates Court of flytipping in Lingfield.

The company was fined £100, asked to pay £200 in compensation to Tandridge District Council, along with legal costs of £396.

On or around July 21 2007, fly tipping took place in St Piers Lane. The Council's Waste Enforcement Officer visited the site, where he found some paperwork with an address in Streatham.

Further investigations revealed the paperwork had come from a care home managed by Crownwise Ltd.

The Waste Enforcement Officer visited the address and interviewed the Company Secretary, who confirmed the waste had come from the home and its removal had been authorised by the company's director. A handwritten receipt was produced which had been given to the company by the fly tipper on payment for the removal of the waste. The contact details on the receipt were false.
